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Childcare training is an important part of running a daycare facility. Parents who leave their children with a daycare provider want to feel that their son or daughter is safe, fed and learning age appropriate activities. If you are in charge of the facility, then it is your responsibility to meet parent expectations and make sure your staff members are getting appropriate childcare training.

These laws are in effect to protect you, as well as, to protect the children in your care. The number of hours each employee will need varies from state to state. Please check with your state's family service department to find out what your facility requirements will be and what courses you will need to take. As the employer, it will fall to you to pay for these courses for your employee. Keep in mind, not having your employees meet their hours could result in severe consequences, such as, fines and possible closure of your facility.

If you've decided to open a daycare in your home, you will need to learn about the rules and regulations your state or country has regarding this endeavor. Though it may sound like an easy process to take care of children from your residence, typically you can't just open your doors for business without obtaining a family homecare license. In order to get a license for your home daycare facility, you will be required to take childcare training courses. Childcare training can provide you with information on running the day to day operations of a home daycare, as well as, how to care for children of varying developmental ages.

In order to find out what childcare training is available in your area, contact your state's family services department. They can provide you with a list showing everything you will need in order to set up a daycare facility from your home, including a list of classes and how many hours it takes to get a license. You will have to pay for the cost of these classes, but not taking them could result in heavy fines and fees. In addition to that, if you have an employee who assists at your home daycare, they must also undergo childcare training.

When taking childcare training, you will be exposed to various topics including planning curriculum. Curriculum refers to the activities you have available for the age group in your care. Even infants can do basic activities that will help with muscle development and coordination. Older kids will have a different curriculum they follow, which may include things like dramatic play, reading time, art, physical education, and basic science/math skills. Having a strong curriculum will be a draw for parents looking to place their child in your facility.
