The most common holiday illnesses encountered by people while on packaged tours abroad include salmonella, cryptosporidium, campylobacter, food poisoning, gastroenteritis, and traveler's diarrhea. Such illnesses are more often than not contracted at resorts and hotels around the globe, especially in places like Cuba, Turkey, Mexico, the Maldives, Spain, and Egypt etc. So what could be the possible solution? Well, to be honest, there are not any for if it is in your fate to suffer from illness during vacations, suffer you will. However, in order to compensate for the damage you can always file for holiday injury compensation claims.

If the quality of food is poor at the hotel where you are putting up, this could actually count as negligence on part of the hotel authorities or the tour operator and therefore, calls for legal action like filing for Holiday compensation. It is the responsibility of the operator to keep you safe during the holiday as far as hygiene and food are concerned. Failing this, he can actually be sued.

In majority of the cases, food prepared or cooked in unhygienic surroundings leads to food poisoning. If such is the case with your resort, then you should take legal action against the authorities. Legally, people have three years in which to file the holiday Injury Compensation Claims. However, it would be advisable not to make unnecessary delays. If you encounter sickness at a package holiday resort in Egypt, Turkey, or the Dominican Republic, our advice would be to report the whole episode to the holiday representative immediately. Next, go ahead and fill a complaint form out. Also, be sure to retain copies of expenses incurred by you during the course of the illness. This can include stuff like medical receipts or prescriptions, which can serve as proofs during the holiday compensation case.

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
